### beat your summer slump with a fasting wakeup call

Two things have coincided in my life recently. First of all, intermittent fasting keeps popping up in conversations and on the news. And secondly, we've hit a summertime slump in our house. The thrill of warm weather and more free time has lost its late-May sheen. The days are humid and hot here, and by the afternoon my boys and I grow restless. I know I should just order us all outside to the sprinkler to burn off some idleness, but the prospect of extra sun and perspiration makes me reluctant to get up and move.

It turns out that this sluggishness is present in all aspects of my life. I have been dragging my feet to get to prayer in the evenings, dragging my feet to get to confession and Mass. I've had a few heavy conversations lately, hearing about the suffering people in my life are undergoing, and I just feel overwhelmed by it and stuck under the heaviness.

The wakeup call I needed - Well, I found a wakeup call that has gently scooped me up from the slump. And while I'm not out taking a daily jog, it at least has me on my feet feeling revived, instead of wallowing on the couch. The key to my revival is a tool I didn't think I'd revisit until Lent of next year: fasting.

This description of fasting by Pope Francis resonated with me, "Fasting wakes us up. It makes us more attentive to God and our neighbor. It revives our desire to obey God, who alone is capable of satisfying our hunger." In this same address, our Holy Father mentions that fasting will help you if "you are disturbed by the spread of iniquity in the world, you are concerned about the chill that paralyzes hearts and actions."

This message is spot on for me right now. I need to wake up with a focus reoriented away from myself and towards God and my

neighbor. And just when I am frustrated by the pain and sin I see around me, I have an antidote. Combining prayer with fasting is a Christian tradition tracing its way back to Jesus Himself. So, I brainstormed how to put this into action.

**Types of fasting** One way to fast is to **fast from food**. Intermittent fasting is quite popular currently as a way to live better — studies show it can help heart health, weight control, and overall well-being. I would like to try it sometime. But if you are pregnant or breastfeeding (or both!) any type of fasting from food is not the best idea.

Alternatively, if hangry is a word people use to describe you regularly, it might be a good idea to find a non-food fasting option out of charity for yourself and others. So, I turned to other ideas about how to fast.

**Fasting from sadness** to be filled with gratitude struck me, so I thought about practical ways to do that. I landed on writing down three things I was grateful for every day, and inviting everyone in my family to share something they were grateful for at dinner.

I have also heard from other people who recommended the different ways they fast. They give up their smartphone for certain periods of the day, sleep without a pillow some nights, or eat foods that are good for their bodies but not their personal favorite. Some people fast from their favorite music or podcasts on certain days of the week.

I've tried some of these ideas in the past weeks and have offered up that fasting for specific people. It has helped so much. I'm not sure why it is, but somehow, I feel more alive and less overwhelmed. The world's problems are still huge, but the tangible act of giving something up and replacing it with goodness has helped me stay grounded.

If you're looking for a spiritual sprinkler for your sluggish summer soul, fasting might be worth a try.



## study: 60% of women who had an abortion did not really want it

A new study conducted by the anti-abortion Charlotte Lozier Institute is examining the opinions and experiences of women who have had abortions. The study, which was peer reviewed, surveyed some 1,000 women aged 41-45, and was released just weeks before the June 24 anniversary of the Supreme Court's decision to overturn Roe v. Wade.

When women with a history of abortion were asked if abortion was consistent with their values or preferences, 70% said it was not. Furthermore, a quarter of respondents who underwent the procedure (25%) described their abortions as "unwanted or co-erced." Broken down, 33% said they wanted their abortion, 43% felt inconsistent about their abortions, 14% said their abortions were unwanted, and 10% said they felt coerced.

The majority of women who had abortions said they felt there were no other options at the time. They cited a lack of financial or social support as the reason why they went through with it. The authors of the study wrote that "60% would have preferred to give birth if they had received either more emotional support or had more financial security."

Overall, one in four women who took the survey reported a history of abortion, which is consistent with the national average. The study's authors noted that the participation rate in the Lozier study was almost three-times higher than that of the "Turnaway Study' conducted by an abortion advocacy group, which purported to find almost universal satisfaction with the decision to abort, despite also finding high levels of regret, sadness, guilt, and anger."

It was also found that women who reported wanting their abortion were the only group who reported any mental health benefits or a net gain in positive emotions from their abortions. Every other group reported more negative emotions and a decline in mental health after their abortions. The authors recommended more social support, from both individuals and society, in terms of financial assistance for those women who are at greatest risk of unwanted abortions. This, they suggest, would allow them "to make choices more in line with their own personal values and preferences."

#### In the Ordinary – Bold Friendship

July 29th is the Feast Day of Saints Martha, Mary, and Lazarus, the siblings from Bethany who were good friends of Jesus. They appear in the Gospels in at least two significant places, teaching us important lessons. Mary and Lazarus have mostly silent roles, but Martha always speaks out boldly to Jesus. Clearly, she was a close friend who wasn't afraid to demand help and compassion from Him.

In reading the Gospel for the feast day, John 11:19-27, I recognized an important parallel that I had never noticed before. Jesus came to Bethany because he had learned that Lazarus had died. Martha went to meet Him and after a powerful dialogue with Jesus, she says these words, "Yes, Lord, I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world." Sound familiar?

When Jesus took his disciples to Caesarea Philippi and asked them, "Who do you say that I am?" Peter replied, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." Almost the same exact words as Martha. Yet to Peter, Jesus replied, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father." I believe that these are the only two people recorded in the Gospels to have made that proclamation and we can confidently acknowledge that Martha's words were revealed to her by the Father too.

Jesus' response to Martha is not recorded and chronologically Martha may have said it first. But Peter is asked to become the first leader of Christ's Church and we have no idea what Martha goes on to do. Most likely she continued to tend her house and serve others behind the scenes. I am sure that is not a slight to Martha. In fact, it elevates the value of her life's work of menial service to that of the Pope. Confirming that all of the work that God calls us to do is equally important in his Kingdom.

**Scripture**: Read John 11:1-27. Reflect on Martha's bold dialogue with Jesus.

**Call to Action:** Speak boldly to Jesus when you pray and trust that the Holy Spirit will inspire you to serve Him in the ordinary.
